World Affairs Council – DC, Africa Society host Youth Forum on Africa for High School Students

WASHINGTON, DC, November 12, 2014: In conjunction with International Education Week, the World Affairs Council – Washington, DC and The Africa Society of the National Summit on Africa will host 500 Washington area high school students for a Youth Forum on Africa on **Monday, November 17** at the Ronald Reagan Building and International Trade Center.

District of Columbia Mayor Vincent Gray has proclaimed November 17, 2014 Youth Forum on Africa Day in recognition of the positive role of youth forums in fostering critical thinking, leadership skills, and cultural awareness.

This program will educate young Americans about Africa in the 21st century, challenge their perceptions about the Continent, and provide a balanced overview of the cultures, economy, challenges, options, and opportunities related to the nations of Africa today.

During this intensive day-long experience the students will have the opportunity to interact with leading experts, diplomats, policymakers and political leaders, and explore topics such as governance, trade and investment, peace and security, and media and communications as they relate to Africa.

Kevin Moose, Social Studies Teacher at Montgomery Blair High School in Silver Spring, said “I have attended several Youth Forums on various topics sponsored by the World Affairs Council. They have all been excellent events bringing students together to work and learn from each other and from professionals in the field. The Youth Forum on Africa is especially vital, this is an area of the world we have neglected for too long and our students will benefit greatly from learning about the challenges and opportunities present in Africa today.”

Dr. Yaya Moussa, member of the WAC-DC Board of Directors, said “Africa, a vast, diverse and rich continent, is emerging as the next economic frontier and is set to play an increasing role in world affairs. It is therefore critical to educate our students about its peoples, cultures, challenges and potential.”
